Building Reconfiguration



All Elementary Buildings: Kindergarten- 4th grade

Allows immediate space for future growth at the elementary level

Kraft Meadows: 5th-6th grade

- Less movement for the younger learner (smaller physical size)
- Pod configuration ideal learning communities

Duncan Lake: 7th-8th grade

- Former High School with amenities for increased extra curricular offerings
- Performing Arts Center, Athletics, Two Gymnasiums, Full Weight Room, Cafeteria Size

Middle Education Schedules



Start and End Times

• 5th -6th grades: Secondary Start & End Time

7th -8th grades: Secondary Start & End Time

Individual Building Schedules

- Building teams will be formed to determine daily schedules
- District content department teams will provide input (Music offerings, World Languages, etc.)
- Sample schedules from districts currently using the 5-6, 7-8 model have been gathered as resources

Timeline for Implementation



Considerations for Implementation in 2020-2021

Pros: Creates immediate space in elementary buildings

5-6 & 7-8 students and staff are together in buildings

Cons: Short time frame for planning and communication

Limited space and reconfiguring space in Duncan Lake (754 Students)

Considerations for Implementation in 2021-2022

Pros: Allows for 18 months of planning (Teachers, curriculum, programs)

Duncan Lake "bubble" enrollment reduces

Cons: Pushes the transition one more year

Potential loss of momentum for the plan
