
## A letter from the Superintendent

#### Dear Caledonia Schools Community,

e're wrapping up our first full in-person school year since the COVID-19 pandemic began in March of 2020, and I couldn't be more proud. Throughout the last two years, our Caledonia Community Schools family has risen to the many challenges we've faced and worked hard to be safe and healthy, keep our students in school and create a learning environment to help them succeed.

We have a lot to celebrate as a result. Consistent with previous years, Caledonia High School finished on a strong note again. The 348 graduates for the Class of 2022 had nearly 186 students (53.4%) who graduated as either Magna Cum Laude (grade point average of 3.5 or above) or Summa Cum Laude (grade point average of 4.0 or above). Additionally, 77% of

our graduates are moving on to pursue higher education, and 23% of our graduates are joining the workforce, serving in our armed forces, or having other plans. As of May 26, 110 Fighting Scots reported receiving 209 scholarships with a 1-year value of \$941,532, and a potential 4-year value of over \$2,892,559!



As you'll see in our final edition of the Cal Communicator for this school year, our CCS community has achieved so much. Some highlights: Bari Kane, school counselor, was named West Michigan Counselor of the Year; the Caledonia boys and girls track relay teams broke two school records, and our students fundraised for various important causes. We also hired multiple new staff members who are committed to student success and learning.

With a note of gratitude, when voters approved the Non-Homestead Operating Millage Renewal in May 2020, they protected Caledonia Community Schools from losing funding year over year. Without the buffer created by the millage renewal, CCS would have lost over \$1.2 million, or roughly \$227 per pupil, over the first three years of the millage. Given the unforeseen challenges brought on by the pandemic, and the rapid inflationary costs that we have all experienced, this would have placed the district in a very difficult position with regard to maintaining the high level of educational quality and service that our students deserve. I want to thank our community again for supporting our students and the future of our district. You can read more on our website about how the operating millage renewal is keeping the district fully funded in the coming school year and through 2025.

While this year has certainly provided some challenges, it's been a great year of learning at school, and we have a lot to look forward to in the coming year! Congratulations to our graduating students and their families. We are excited about another fantastic school year. Have a fun and safe summer!

## CCS Counselor Honored as West Michigan Counselor of the Year

Bari Kane, a counselor for CCS, has been named West Michigan Counselor of the Year by the West Michigan Counseling Association. Kane has worked at CCS for 18 years and is a counselor at Duncan Lake Middle School. She was previously a fourth-grade classroom teacher at Paris Ridge Elementary.

As the number of school-age children reporting poor mental health increases, having effective and passionate counselors in school has grown even more important. According to the U.S. Centers for Disease

Control and Prevention, more than 1 in 3 high school students had experienced persistent feelings of sadness or hopelessness in 2019, a 40 percent increase since 2009. The COVID-19 pandemic has exacerbated mental health issues affecting students.

CCS is proud of Bari for achieving this honor and serving all our students so well. We're fortunate to have such a dedicated and caring counselor at CCS, especially as mental health issues have become more prevalent in school-age children and technology and social media have presented new challenges. ## Families Learn About Issues Impacting Students

n March, CCS students and families learned about real-life issues facing children during a virtual facilitated discussion hosted by our school district. The discussion centered around "Childhood 2.0," a documentary released in 2020 about issues that impact the lives of children, including cyberbullying, online predators, suicidal ideation and more.

"Because we spend so much of our lives online, it's important for students to better understand how social media works and how it can negatively impact us, from our thinking and emotions to our relationships with others," said Dr. Dedrick Martin, superintendent of CCS. "Our hope in having these important discussions is for students and parents to better understand the pressures of online exposure and to learn strategies for caring for themselves in this digital age and feel more open to talking about these issues."

Data show that even before COVID-19, mental health challenges were the leading cause of poor life outcomes for young people, with up to 1 in 5 children ages 3 to 17 nationwide having a mental, emotional, developmental or behavioral disorder, according to the U.S. Surgeon General. The pandemic added to these challenges for our nation's youth.

Families were encouraged to watch the documentary together during midwinter break, and during the panel discussion were given the opportunity to ask questions about the documentary.



### **Bond Work Continues Across District**

onstruction continues this summer on projects funded by the \$88 million bond passed by voters in May 2020. Construction is slated to begin this summer on the new Dutton Elementary and the Cal Community Center.

Some of the other highlights we are looking forward to for the summer of 2022 include:

- Roofing replacement at Emmons Lake Elementary and the High School (north).
- Roofing sectional replacement at Caledonia Elementary, Kettle Lake Elementary, and Duncan Lake Middle School.
- Replacement of all the remaining school monument signs.
- Several landscaping projects throughout the district.
- Several security improvement projects throughout the district.

Work at Duncan Lake Middle School will also continue with door, door frame and fire glass upgrades surrounding the new central classroom areas as well as continued improvements to the new main entrance on Kraft Avenue.

We are working through a challenging construction environment that we believe will continue into the foreseeable future. Supply chain issues, manufacturing delays and staffing availability have changed the way we budget and set timelines for various projects.

We continue to work closely with our owner's representatives Plante Moran-CRESA, technology advisors Communications by Design, Architectural firms Tower-Pinkster (schools construction)/Stantec C2AE (Cal Community Center) and the engineering firm Structure TEC to keep the bond projects on time and within budgets. Our construction firms The Christman Company (schools) and Rockford Construction (Cal Community Center) have been an integral part in helping us keep our schedules and costs in line.

These construction challenges, especially the availability and pricing of steel, have led to extended design timelines for the new Dutton Elementary and the Cal Community Center.


