

## **Emmons Lake OM at World Finals**

An Odyssey of the Mind team from Emmons Lake Elementary represented Michigan at the 2018 OM World Finals. The four day event took place at Iowa State University, May 23-26, where over 800 teams from 14 countries joined together in competition.

Odyssey of the Mind is a program that encourages students to "think outside the box," while using teamwork, creativity, arts, science and technology to solve problems. Each year, teams choose one of five themed long term problems to tackle over the course of the year, without adult assistance. In addition, teams are presented with a spontaneous problem at each competition, where they must come together to find a solution on the spot.

The team from Emmons Lake competed in a problem titled Triathlon Travels. The team worked together to design and build an original vehicle that had to complete three different challenges. They used their vehicle to try to score in "curling", hit the right targets when "jousting", and "run track" by navigating around objects, both forward and backward. Between the events, they had to entertain the audience and make their vehicle change appearance. All of this had to be completed in eight minutes, while maintaining a budget of less than \$145.

Placing first at both regional and state competitions, Emmons Lake's Division 1 team, coached by Caryn Kersey, advanced to the World Finals. Team members included Jenny George, Elizabeth Hilton, Adlai Kersey, D.J. Potgeter, Jake Potgeter, Patrick Harmon and Halle Stout. The team based their solution on Buffalo Bill's Wild West Show. Each teammate became a character that they found while researching the wild west show. The "track race" was a barrel race event in which the vehicle had to travel forward and backward around the barrels without hitting them. The "curling" event became the "Chicken Chase" where the chicken had to land inside the target zones in order to score points for the team. In the "jousting" event, five out of nine targets had

to be knocked over, while the remaining four stayed standing. Their presentation also included an amazing set of props including a vehicle that looked like a horse, a hand painted grandstand, handmade hobby horses, a commentators booth made completely of tape, and many other great pieces.

At the regional competition, the team was awarded a Ranatra Fusca Creativity award, which is the highest award that can be given to an Odyssey of the Mind team. The team won the award for demonstrating outstanding creativity in their problem solutions.

Emmons Lake placed 6th overall out of 53 teams in their division. They had a spectacular performance for their long term problem, that earned them 1st for the technical aspects of the problem, and 2nd for the style. The hours the students put into preparing for this competition are immeasurable, and as a result, they all learned so much!

Thile at the competition, the team also enjoyed both the opening and closing ceremonies, as well as visits to the Creativity Festival. Another favorite activity was "pin trading", where students trade pins with students from other states and countries. As a part of the experience, Emmons Lake students were paired with a "buddy team" from the International School of Geneva in Switzerland. This was the third year for these students to be buddy teams with this school, allowing the team to reconnect with friends they had made last year, as well as meet some new friends. Students were able to enjoy many meals together and support each other at their performances. The teams also exchanged gifts representing their respective countries.

Odyssey of the Mind has taught these students how to think creatively and work together to find a solution to a problem. It was great to see how this trip to the World Finals in Iowa brought them closer together as a team. They did an outstanding job representing Emmons Lake and our Caledonia community!
