2025 - Celebrating 75 years and grand re-opening

The Heart of Caledonia for 75 Years

For 75 years, Ralph E. Myers Stadium has been more than a field—it has been the heart of Caledonia. Generations of Scots have chased state titles, broken records, and built memories that last a lifetime here. From the track dominance of the 1990s to recent excellence in football, color guard, cheer, marching band, and chorale, this is where Caledonia's spirit is seen shining through. And year after year, proud Caledonia alumni, parents, and residents gather to cheer on the next generation.

The story began in 1950 when the field was moved from Lakeside Park. Coach Auwater used the first football practice of the season to have the players of the 1950 Fighting Scots help finish laying the first sod. That fall, they played their home games at night under lights on their brand new field.

Ralph E. Myers was a visionary force in the creation, development, and improvement of the field. He was a tireless worker, a persuasive salesman, and a unifying force for our community. From 1950 to 1954, he rallied students, parents, neighbors, and businesses to build and improve the field, hauling in sod, transplanting it, watering it, and working side by side to make it a true home for the Fighting Scots.

Ralph Myers did not live to see the completion of the final vision for the field. He was tragically killed in an automobile accident in the summer of 1954. At homecoming that fall, the field was rededicated in his honor. His vision endures in every game and performance here.

At the first dedication in 1950, Congressman Gerald R. Ford was scheduled to speak but was detained in Washington for a late Congressional session. He sent a message to the Caledonia community, which will be read aloud tonight, 75 years later, to close the loop on that moment in history.

From the 1950 football team to the students and fans of today, this stadium remains where tradition meets tomorrow. We carry forward Ralph's legacy by working together, building together, and keeping Caledonia's spirit alive for generations to come.







Honorary Captain - Vern Kayser

Vern Kayser's name is woven into Caledonia's athletic history. A proud member of the legendary 1950 Fighting Scots football team, Vern wore #18 during the undefeated, unscored-upon season. He will serve as Honorary Captain for the first home football game, joining the coin toss before kickoff as we honor both our storied past and our bright future.

When asked about that historic season, Vern smiled and said, "The other teams didn't have many first downs — we had a pretty good defense." He remembers how the team laid sod for their first practice as part of the transition from Lakeside Park to the new athletic field. "We were all hoping for a field to play on... everyone was excited that we had a new field. It was nothing like it is now, but it was good at that time."

The Unscored-Upon Season

In 1950, the Caledonia football team achieved something no other team in school history has matched: an undefeated, untied, unscored-upon season. Over 14 straight games spanning the last six games of 1949 and the entire 1950 season, they shut out every opponent, outscoring them 234 to 0 in 1950 alone. There were no state playoffs in those days. However, being ranked among the top ten class C teams in the statewide United Press Poll, this was one of the most remarkable teams in Caledonia's history. That fall, the team also helped lay the very first sod at the stadium, marking the beginning of 75 years of Caledonia football tradition. Their grit, unity, and legacy live on in every game played on this field today —and that is why we are proud to honor them at our first home game of the 2025 season.

Now, in 2025, the "Scotties" are being recognized again, this time for ranking second in state history for Consecutive Defensive Shutouts, going 14 straight games without allowing a single point. This streak spanned the final six games of 1949 and the entire 1950 season.
